Nagauta (Long Song) and Sakurasaku (Blooming Cherry Blossoms) Performed by Hikota

Nichibi is a Japanese dance style evolved from kabuki theatre, which combines dance, music and drama. Kabuki often features male actors in female roles, attempting to express the essence of femininity. Two different acts will be performed: Nagauta expresses the early spring arrival and Sakurasaku is about a woman thinking of her love while watching at falling cherry

blossoms. The performer is Hikota who was born in Japan and started *nichibu* (dance) lessons at the age of two. Being one of the few successors of the nichibu dance, he performed at various places both outside and in Japan, promoting Japanese traditional dance.

New York Taiko Aiko Kai is one of the Taiko groups in residence as part of the TC Taiko Society at Teachers College, Columbia University. It began in 2002 when a few families at an Upper West Side public school began practicing Taiko with a hope to pass Japanese culture to their children. The group has always been family oriented, but many adults have also joined the group over the years. Hiro Kurashima, Osuwa Daiko Shihan, who was certified by the late Grandmaster Daihachi Oguchi, was the founding teacher of the group, and continues to teach and perform with the group regularly. NYTAK has performed at various schools and institutions, including the Sakura

Matsuri at the Brooklyn Botanical Garden, Japan Heritage Day at the Japan Day in Central Park, and public and private schools in New York.
